 - Reduced Field Mowing




Where the Birds Are . . .

Not Surprising:

Western Woodland (Zone 5) Has Most Diversity with 52%

More Surprising is the Number of Species Seen in Zone 6


- Manicured Lawns (Zone 6) Similar to Meadows (Zone 1)
- This is Likely an Artifact of More Surveyors in Zone 6




Where the Plants Are . . .

• Not Surprising:

Wildlife Habitat Committee

- Western Woodland (Zone 5) Has Most Diversity with 31%
- More Surprising is the Number of Species Seen in Zone 4
 - Lawton Valley, Though Small in Size, Is Biodiverse

10+1 Species Confirmed:


- Key Promoting Factors

Not Surprising:

Western Woodland (Zone 5) Has Most Diversity with 47%
